## ANNUAL REPORT, 2014

## **General Report**

Christa visited Angela in Mexico in February, and Naume and Rebecca in Uganda and Jennifer Anselm, Jennifer Joseph and Winnifrida Leonard in Tanzania in November and December. All the girls are doing fairly well, although Angela struggles a bit in such a large school, and Jeni Joseph is struggling in her classes. She is receiving tutoring to help her out. Glenda in Nicaragua left the program when she dropped out of school and got married.

Maria and Pascuala Alicia from Guatemala joined the organization via a connection we made starting with Vicki, our contact in Mexico. She put us in touch with an organization here in the U.S. called Kids in Need of Defense (KIND), which has an arm that works with Guatemalan children who need help repatriating back into Guatemalan society after having been deported from the US. Through them, we met Alicia and Maia, both Maya K'iche who very much want to study, and whose families support them. While they themselves were not deported from the U.S., both girls have brothers who were, so things are challenging at home and the help they receive from us is critical.

At the end of 2014, ONE has 24 scholarship recipients, representing ten countries: Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru, Haiti, Tanzania, Uganda, Nepal and India. The girls range in age from 6 to early 30s. All are doing well, and the letters we are receiving are showing wonderful progress in English for those girls who don't speak it natively.

We have Benefactors for the following students: Winnie, Mireya, Alondra, Sua, Fatima, Karina, and half of Camila's fees every year. Efforts continue to find Benefactors for the other girls. The Flagstaff Arts and Leadership Academy's National Honors Society students are raising money to pay for Naume in Uganda. They held a very successful dance and music concert and raised \$700, and FALA held another incredibly successful fundraiser called "Chairs for Change," which raised about \$5000 to split between our foundation and the Malala Fund. We are very grateful for all of the help we have received from them!

Additional fundraising efforts were focused on the website, word of mouth, electronic mailings and the annual fundraiser, the Family Dance Party, which brought in about \$400 in September. We are looking at an outdoor all-day event for 2016 that involves a fun run, booths and music. The Facebook page is has 148 likes, and contains albums of all the scholarship recipients, which are updated regularly.

The board agreed that we wanted to create a bit more guidance in the mid-term and yearend letters that the students write to us. We receive wonderful thank you letters, but we would really like to hear more about what they are learning and doing, what short and long-term goals they have and how they might be able to help people using their education right now, as opposed to in many years. Modified versions of the year-end questions have been given out already, and beginning in 2015, the contacts will receive all the questions to give out to the girls.

The year-end appeal brought in \$2,850 in additional donations. Between fundraisers and individual donations, the foundation brought in more than \$22,000 in 2014; 81% of our budget went to our students this year.
