***ANNUAL REPORT, 2015***

***General Report***

The board decided to legally change the name of the foundation to One New Education. It was proving too confusing to people to have two names. Although we had registered One New Education as a trade name, it seemed easier to just change the name so that everything is the same. This was accomplished by the middle of the year.

Bhumi in Nepal and Guddi in India both left the program because their families moved. Bhumi's family went to Kathmandu after the earthquake and Guddi's family had to leave because of a property dispute. Guddi did pass her exams to reenter school, so we hope she continues on. We welcomed Prachi from India to the organization. Prachi is in Third Standard, and her mother strongly supports her and her sister's education. They have both been studying after school with Aarti, who introduced us.

Almost all of the girls are doing very well. Most of the girls in Nicaragua were allowed to march in the annual parade because they had averages in the 80s or 90s. Naume continues to shine in school, as do Bencille, Camila, Tatiana and Sua. There was something of an upheaval at the orphanage in Tanzania and it caused our girls there to struggle a little. Jenipha Joseph did not pass her year, and will repeat Form Six. Husna is doing well in her school. Rebecca in Uganda and Roshani in Nepal continue to struggle, but they are trying.

Camila moved to an extremely good private school in Tegucigalpa, the Dowal School. We will continue to pay the same amount we have and her aunt and uncle in the United States will pay the rest. This will allow her to have an American high school diploma as well as a Honduran one when she graduates.

At the end of 2015, ONE has 24 scholarship recipients, representing ten countries: Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru, Haiti, Tanzania, Uganda, Nepal and India. The girls range in age from 6 to 17.

The Flagstaff Arts and Leadership Academy's National Honors Society students raised \$350 in their fundraiser for Naume in November. FALA held another "Chairs for Change" fundraiser, which raised \$1,662.75. We are very grateful for all of the help we have received from them! Additional fundraising efforts were focused on the website, word of mouth and the blog. The Facebook page is has 165 likes and contains albums of all the scholarship recipients, which are updated regularly.

Ryan and Cole Heinsius left the board due to family obligations. In February, Janeece Henes and Larami Sandlin joined the board and in October, Meghan Haslam joined the board. All of them bring different skills and talents, from business to education to fluent Spanish.

The year-end appeal brought in \$3,400 in additional donations. Between fundraisers and individual donations, the foundation brought in more than \$17,000 in 2015; 85% of our total budget went directly to our students this year.
